LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

DEAR FRIENDS,

You tend to know it when a life event is big enough to change you. You don't always know immediately how it will change you though. We've thrown around the words "life-changing", "world-changing", "harrowing" a lot the past couple years. A year ago, I could tell you, did tell you, how we'd attempted to adjust into it, tried to adapt, not fully knowing what was yet to come.

What is most surprising about this particular moment for our organization, for our little crew of passionate and overachieving fire-starters, is the sense of calm starting to set in. When I think over the events of the last 3 years, I can feel the panicked uncertainty we've lived in. I feel the light stomach as we realize the height of the learning curve, the roller coaster car about to careen down into total unknown, the impending drop.

That feeling is still there, just further back. That feeling, that at the time seemed like the new forever, has dimmed. I went to start this letter with how great everything is, how sure of our footing we feel, I caught myself. It's never felt so crazy to be sure of your feet. It all sounded too ridiculous to say out loud.

Here are just the facts, ridiculous or not. We now have key leadership rolls filled for every department in the organization for the first time since 2014. We've added a total of two full time (about to be three) and two part time positions. We started 2022 with the first perfectly balanced budget in, well, I have no idea how long; no contingent programs waiting for a bout of good luck, no mid-year rabbits coming out of hats or



anything. We executed the first year of a now annual \$100K per year artist project grant and funded nine new projects around the state. We helped start a recording studio and partnered on a new program to support performing artists in the state. The BLACC raised funds and mounted a photovoice project, and ended up taking in over 250 photographs to represent "Black Life in Mobile". We've supported (with cash money) the work of XXX artists and curators in the last year. We've made video tours of the exhibitions, got multiple write-ups in multiple publications, mentions on APTV, and on nationally scoped podcasts. And we have had the honor to work on and mount some of the best exhibitions I've seen. Period. Not just in the South, but some of the best I've seen.

And all of that is additional to the strong work we were already doing in education and our existing programs.

I'm not going to say that the unexpected education we've gotten, the whole world got really, was worth it, somehow justified by the fact that we've survived. I absolutely will not say the pandemic happened for a "reason". This is not a search for a silver lining that will magically undo the very real losses so many have experienced, or an overzealous dismissal of the fact that some of the ways the world has changed may not be for the better. There is so much work to be done, for us and for others.

I will say we are actively taking on whatever good, whatever reason we might make out of it. And we have made a decision to be better for it. We can't be the organization we were 3 years ago, so if we aren't better today, then what on earth are we doing.

ORGANIZATION DESCRIPTION:

Founded in 1999, Alabama Contemporary Art Center (ACAC) is a non-profit contemporary arts center located on Cathedral Square in the heart of Mobile's historic downtown district. Located in the old Press Register building in historic downtown Mobile, we are a non-collecting organization that is committed to the work of living artists. We serve our community by originating ten to twelve exhibitions a year, offering public programming, adult and children's education, and outreach programming. Through guest curatorship, artist residencies, and our Independent Projects program, we create sustainable opportunities for curators and artists worldwide to make work, take risks, and explore divergent paths. Our first floor boasts of 16 thousand square feet of exhibition space used for rotating exhibitions and site specific installations. On the third floor we have that same quantity of space for education, performances and public programs.

For our community, we provide a third space free of cultural or political bias, where individuals can find and create meaning. By holding space for difference, empathetic communication of ideas, and diverse cultural representation, we play an integral role in building a sense of cultural identity with our community that contributes to the quality of life in Mobile.

From the stay at home orders and six-feet-rules of the COVID-19 Pandemic, to housing discrimination and systemic racism which has had lasting reprecussions for more than a century, Distances gives a visual representation of the challenging social and economical distances we have, and are still enduring.

July 9 - October 2, 2021

Guest Curator Jackie Clay (York, Alabama), and filmmaker Bo McGuire, will pull from and re-contextualize the archives of LGBTQ+ spaces in partnership with the Invisible Histories Project. The Invisible Histories Project is a community driven project whose goal is the collection and preservation of the complex LGBTQ history of the South.



Sept 9, 2021- December 12, 2021

Part of the Equal Justice Initiative's Community Remembrance projects, and in collaboration with the Mobile County Commission, ACAC is hosting story-gathering events and exhibitions of the soil gathered from lynching sites in Mobile every six months over the next two years. In 2023 this work will culminate into an exhibition for new work by Black southern artists dealing with what it is to remember and ultimately transcend trauma.



DAZZLE AND DEGRADE

Solo Exhibition, Artist Jenny Day based in Santa Fe, New Mexico [Independent Projects Program].

Day's work addresses environmental and cultural collapse, depicting fraught and broken landscapes filled with the milieu of everyday life. Day will create a site-specific installation of natural and personal disaster, wounded and celebratory, made up of multiple large paintings and sculptures.



MASTA MY LANGUAGE

New work by Artist Nyugen Smith based in New Jersey, New York Curated by DASH [Guest Curator Program]

Masta My Language is an ongoing, multi-part project that includes original poetry, mixed-media works on paper, sculpture/installation, performance art, and experimental musical scores. The project began with an original poem, "A Letter Home Hoping to Reach You Soon." The poem reflects the artist's desire to further create connections, a deeper understanding and knowledge of his Haitian ancestry.

THE BLACK LIFE ARTS AND CULTURE COALITION

is a subcommittee of ACAC's Board of Directors, working to realize public-facing projects that lift up Black artists and voices in the Mobile community, in line with the ACAC mission and in pursuit of equity and accountability in the arts.



Photography Workshops – March 17, March 24, March 31, April 2, April 6, April 9, and April 13, 2022. The classes took place in community centers around the city of Mobile including Hillsdale, Seals, Dotch, and Hope Community Centers. Attendance total: 48 people Artists Served: 4 Photographers

2022 PHOTOVOICE PROJECT:

Mobile, Alabama presents itself as a city with a proud tradition of public art and culture—the Downtown Business District and other prosperous areas of the city are filled with art and culture. But even though the city's population is over 50% Black, very little of the publicly visible art in the city celebrates Black life and culture. Through this project, the Black Life Arts and Culture Coalition (BLACC) aims to work in collaboration with the Black communities of the city to change the landscape of Mobile's artistic and cultural representation to better represent the diversity of our city and celebrate the rich cultural heritage of Black communities.



The cornerstone of our undertaking is a photovoice project. Photovoice is a research methodology used often in the social sciences to aid in better understanding of the challenges faced within a community. In our use of photovoice, we will place cameras into the hands of people across Mobile's Black communities and invite them to document their answer to the question, "What is Black Life in Mobile?" As we build a collection of photographs taken by Black Mobilians of all ages, genders, classes, abilities, and sexualities in answer to this question, the collection

will foster a wellspring of thought and idea about the experience of Black Life in Mobile. By engaging Black artists and the broader community in dialogue with and creative response to these ideas, we aim to foster and change the landscape of Black artistic and cultural representation in Mobile. The culmination of this project will result in an exhibition of the submitted photos MAY of 2022.

In 2022 we collected and displayed 255 photos submitted from the community.

2021 INITIATIVES

THE VERDANT FUND PROJECT GRANT

The Verdant Fund is a new project grant that seeks to fund independent artists with site-specific exhibition concepts, independent projects, or new work as it is relevant to the community we serve. An expansion of the Warhol Foundation's Regional Re-granting program, the Verdant Fund supports creative practice born of and within Alabama. Administered through a partnership between Alabama Contemporary Art Center (Mobile, AL), Coleman Center for the Arts (York, AL), and Space One Eleven (Birmingham, AL), our goal is to reach a broad range of artists across all geographic areas of the state and expand and support creative practice at the margins.

The Verdant Fund is proud to announce the results of its inaugural re-granting cycle for projects born of and within Alabama. In 2021, Verdant Fund awarded over \$60,000 in grants to Alabama artists creating and presenting outward-facing, community-based projects.

From a highly competitive group of applicants, projects were reviewed by a panel of professionals that ultimately selected the following nine artists to receive up to \$7,000 in funding each, for a grant total of \$60,125. Each project will be supported throughout the year and documented on the Verdant Fund website.

To date, the Foundation has given nearly \$260 million in cash grants to over 1,000 arts organizations in 49 states and abroad and has donated 52,786 works of art to 322 institutions worldwide.



ARTIST IN RESIDENCE

SOYNIKA EDWARDS-BUSH IS FINISHING OUT HER TWO-YEAR RESIDENCY AT ALABAMA CONTEMPORARY

Alabama Contemporary Art Center(ACAC) is honored to have hosted Soynika Edwards-Bush as artist-in-residence. Bush began her residency August 31, 2020, and will mount her first museum solo exhibition as the culmination of her residency December 9, 2022. Bush is a self-taught artist, mother of four, and wife, born and raised in Prichard. Bush, who is community focused and driven to bring art to her city, has worked alongside Legacy 166 and the Boys and Girls Club to bring art into the lives of children.

The artist-in-residence program is part of an on-going commitment to grow and sustain creative practice in the region. By supporting artists, we support community and culture-building for the South, we re-define both ourselves and what is possible here.

CARTOGRAPHER RECORDS WE NOW HAVE A FULL SERVICE RECORDING STUDIO ON OUR THIRD FLOOR

Cartographer Records is a record label whose mission is to help small independent artists record and release original music. The organization was founded in 2020 by Bryan Gottshall and James Black as a way to aid musicians seeking to release music in their respective communities of Mobile, AL and New Orleans, LA. The label seeks to give musicians a way to record their music and have it professionally mixed and mastered. Cartographer also guides artists during the release process, helping them explore different distribution channels and physical or digital formats.

THE STUDIO:

Housed on the 3rd floor of Alabama Contemporary, Cartographer Studio pays int rent through an exchange of robust programming commitments including a video concert series and patchwork symphony, administered through the Higher Ground Society, and pays the rest of it's costs through commercial album recording. As full service recording studio, both partnership programming and Cartographer's independent work center around seeding growth in the cultural production of the South.

2021 EDUCATION

We have built our education model around providing a space for courageous conversation. By holding space for difference, empathetic communication of ideas, and diverse cultural representation, we play an integral role in building our state's cultural identity, and contributing to human dignity and the cultural esteem of the Deep South. This year we served XX students, hired X teaching Artists and created X new digital education programs

OUR EDUCATIONAL MISSION:

To create educational experiences that stimulate critical thinking, dialogue and curiosity for the creation of meaning in the South Alabama community. We support cultural actors that dismantle cultural boundaries and reclaim identities. The education department approaches artistic skill as a communication tool to inspire discussion about the human experience while celebrating diverse, underrepresented voices and uplifting their ideas.





Responding to the global pandemic, a site-specific immersive exhibition project *Moonment* (Moon-Moment) is an independent solo exhibition at Alabama Contemporary Art Center. The motivation of this project is from a Chinese poem by Tang Dynasty poet Jiuling Zhang: 'When the moon rises above the sea level, people no matter where they are, see the moon and connect to each other by sharing the moonlight of that moment.' Inspired by the idea of the moon, in this work a "heart" with beating sounds is created, together with metallic moving waves. People see the heart, hear the sound, thereby connecting to the ones they love beyond distances.

ANCESTRAL LIGHT SERIES New Work by TONY BINGHAM

In 2012, Bingham spent a week with a family in Africatown. While there, he began making connections and capturing pinhole images of the people and sites. The house he stayed in served as a make shift darkroom and film changing space for his cameras. He visited the fishing holes, graveyards, archeological sites, creeks and churches. The work was almost incidental, Bingham was primarily on a journey without an outcome in mind, and stumbled into a body of work that begins to document the rich history of a profoundly important place, that few seemed to know of at the time.



FLASHING THE LEATHER

Guest Curated by Aaron Levi Garvey, *Flashing the Leather* is an exhibition of contemporary art using baseball as a point of reference and inspiration over the last 25 years since the infamous baseball strike of 1994. Works included in the exhibition revolve around the notions of baseball, its archetypes, the superstitions within the game and the use of baseball objects as an artist's medium. The exhibition includes painting, installation and single channel video installation.

JUN 10 - AUG 27, 2022

SURPLUS IN PANTOMIME

Guest Curated by Y. Malik Jalal (GA)

Inspired by Ben Vereen's 1981 tribute performance to the great black vaudevillian Bert Williams at the Reagan inaugural gala, Surplus in Pantomime contextualizes abstraction in the broader conversation of black identity. Pantomime, in Jalal's view, is a vantage point from which to view how the gestures of black artists become loaded with cultural assumptions often beyond the artist's intent. "The creative and cultural work of black folks exists in the abstract." Jalal writes, describing a specific relationship to form that is "never neutral". Through the work of five artists, Jalal explores what the politics and possibilities are in making work from a fraught and complicated place of interdependence on material culture. Surplus In Pantomime, through collage on textile, pigment on canvas, and twisted and shaped forms, leverages ambiguity to signal the psychological state of black folks, and reclaim the gesture.

THE LOST CAUSE New Work By BRANDON DEAN (OH)

The Lost Cause merges tropes from art history and contemporary image culture to construct an alternate reality that critiques representations of race and masculinity, ultimately exploring "history" as a malleable and inherently creative enterprise. The work reimagines elements of American history with a new mythology replete with iconography that subverts the white male gaze.

NEW WORK BY ELSA MARÍA MELÉNDEZ

Mounting her first solo exhibtion in the United States, Elsa María Meléndez (Born 1974, Caguas, Puerto Rico) is a printmaker and creator of installations where she incorporates embroidery, stitch, and large amounts of synthetic materials. The iconography in her work shows features of the Puerto Rican idiosyncrasy and summarizes debates that respond to uncertainty faced with cultural destruction, exhaustion of human relations, the decline in public policy, and lack of gender equality.

BETWEEN THE SNAKES

Guest Curated by curatorial collective Triptych Arts, *Between the Snakes* is an exhibition that looks at the different codices of Black folk magic and its widespread international iterations that continue to challenge Eurocentric modernist binaries. SOMETIMES THEY LISTEN Site-specific installation by AKIKO ICHIKAWA

Since July 2018, I've been collecting all of the un-recyclable, non

biodegradable stuff (usually of plastic but also the hybrid material that lids and covers are made of) that encases the food, art, and other products I buy to maintain my life and art practice in Brooklyn. Entitled *Sometimes They Listen*, for the ongoing action, I have been mailing tailored letters to these manufacturers and distributors, asking them to replace their current packaging, which now includes "recyclable" #1 and #2 containers and plastic as in practice they are not recycled except in places like San Francisco. I often times give concrete suggestions, while performatively pushing a polemic via the recently-lost craft of personal correspondence while providing a social service and supporting the U.S. Postal Service. I use art to shed journalistic light on specific companies, plastic's use in advertising, the names of cities and towns most have never heard of, and which states/provinces produce this kind of trash (it is hardly limited to red states)."

EX TABULA RASA Site-specific installation by SALLY HELLER (LA)

EX-Tabula RASA represents a different trend of thought; we live in an age rife with data overflow, convenience, and product-laden desire. Constantly fed with artificial intelligence, social media and communication in the form of code, we are taking in, accessing and ejecting new and old ideas every minute. Our bank of knowledge is forever mutable. We are anything but blank slates. Avienna of the 11th century said: "Knowledge is attained through "empirical familiarity with objects in this world from which one abstracts universal concepts." When viewers enter EX-Tabula RASA, they will be asked to discard preconceptions and experience a transformed reality. Objects are not what they seem.
